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# TOGETHER WE HOLD ON TO HOPE

EDITORIAL

**In the wake of the pandemic, Europe once became the epicentre of a cruel war, a situation of inequality and violence that we thought we had put behind us. Deeply saddened by the development, we were nonetheless challenged to ramp up our relief efforts with displaced people on the borders.**

The girl on our cover was photographed at the Ukrainian-Polish border, just days after the conflict broke out. She is waiting, together with her mother and 200 others, to be taken to the Medyka train station to flee the war and seek a brighter future, one of solidarity and hope.

**We can't fail her and the thousands of refugees we work for in partnership with the Jesuit Refugee Service. Nor can we fail the world's most vulnerable children that we join forces with Fe y Alegría to support in thousands of schools around the world.**

We've worked hard for each and every one of them over this past year through our more than **200 active projects** in **45 countries**, serving over **360,000 people** and their communities.

This is a team effort at Entreculturas that involves the collaboration of a range of professional departments, more than 650 volunteers, 27 regional offices, **the support of a social base of nearly 32,000 people** and over 240 companies and public and private partnering institutions.

My term as Executive Vice President of Entreculturas and Alboan came to an end in April 2023 and I close out my years here comforted and hopeful when I think about this tremendous experience of leadership and shared impact on such an enormous scale for the good of so many people. This level of collective effort, for which I am immensely grateful, is reflected in this report.

Effort which my Jesuit colleague **Martín Iriberry** will continue to drive forward with his input and insights into the international mission and social work in Spain. Efforts that will continue to advance justice and dignity by promoting the causes that move us: guaranteeing the right to education, socio-environmental justice, gender equality, participation and commitment to migrants and refugees.

**Thank you for joining us in these efforts, thank you for continuing to keep hope alive.**

## WAR IN UKRAINE

The outbreak of **war in Ukraine** forced millions of people to flee their homes in search of refuge in other parts of the country or in neighbouring ones. In collaboration with the Xavier Network, the Jesuit Refugee Service and the Jesuit Migrant Service, at Entreculturas and Alboan we activated our emergency protocol **to provide care, shelter and support for those who have been displaced.**

## URGENT NEED TO SAVE EDUCATION

With initiatives such as **#BillionsOfVoices**, promoted by the Global Campaign for Education, and “The place where everything is possible”, the slogan of our **The Red Chair** campaign, we advocated for increased international funding to strengthen education systems, particularly in the countries hardest hit by the pandemic.

## ADVOCATING FOR THE AMAZON AND ITS PEOPLE



By launching **“Somos Amazonia”** (We Are the Amazon) campaign together with Alboan, we are mobilising the population to combat climate change and to defend the Amazon and the people who live there. The related **“Defensoras de la Naturaleza”** (Defenders of Nature) exhibition was displayed in schools, town halls and cultural centres.

## 11TH EDITION OF “RUN FOR A CAUSE”

The **11th edition** of our “Run for a Cause” solidarity race that we put on together with Alboan brought together more than **17,000 people** in 24 Spanish cities and eight countries to defend indigenous peoples and their lands.

We were able to hold this event thanks, once again, to the support of Caixabank, Deloitte, Liferay and Mapfre (and the help of more than 60 other companies) and were joined by actresses Cristina Gallego (who kicked off the race in Madrid) and Kira Miró and the karate expert Damián Quintero.



## TOGETHER WITH "MUJERES EN MARCHA" (WOMEN ON THE MOVE)

Our work in gender equality this year focused specifically on migrant, displaced and refugee women. In March, working together with Alboan, we promoted the **Women on the Move** campaign to mark International Women's Day and travelled to **DR Congo** to learn about the realities on the ground and the impact that violence has on the lives of women forced to leave their homes.



## NEW PODCAST WITH JULIA NAVARRO

We launched "**Voces por una Causa**" (Voices for a Cause), the Entreculturas podcast hosted by **writer and journalist Julia Navarro**, as a vehicle for sharing the issues, projects and campaigns that our work involves. Podcasts are streamed every Thursday and can be enjoyed on a range of platforms including Spotify, Ivoox, Apple Podcast and YouTube.



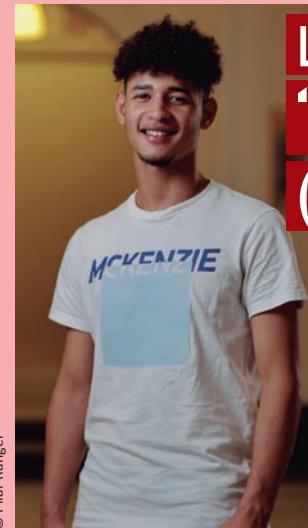
## ARA MALIKIAN SOLIDARITY CONCERT

The event was an opportunity for the Lebanese-born artist of Armenian descent to demonstrate how music can be a means of communication, support and solidarity.



## WE CELEBRATE THE CLEAR COMMITMENT TO THE 0.7

Spain's approval of the Law on Cooperation could not have been a better way to end the year. After decades of advocacy, Congress confirmed its commitment to allocate **0.7% of the country's Gross National Income to cooperation projects.**



## LAUNCH OF "SOY ACOGIDA" (I AM WELCOMED)

Hand in hand with the NGO Pueblos Unidos, we launched **Soy Acogida** ([www.soyacogida.org](http://www.soyacogida.org)). Under the slogan "I am hope, I am opportunities, I am the future", we aim to promote a culture of hospitality, welcome and solidarity for migrants.

We defend **education** as a human right, we work to ensure the dignity of the lives of **migrants and refugees** and we are committed to building a committed global citizenship, one rooted in **gender equality** and **environmental** justice. These are the “5 Just Causes” that underpin our mission.

Our team is **761 people** (including employees, volunteers and collaborators) distributed across **27 regional offices** throughout Spain and a community of **31,892 people** who support our work (7,740 members, 19,035 donors and 5,117 one-off collaborators).

In 2022, we worked in **45 countries** and promoted **204 projects**, supporting a total of **361,442 people**.

# TRANSPARENCY IN OUR MISSION

At Entreculturas we cultivate a culture of transparency which, beyond the legal obligations of accountability, is designed to ensure the right that all the people, companies and institutions that support us have to know where and how we invest our resources. We are proud to say that 90% of our funds go towards our mission.



# SOURCE OF FUNDS

Entreculturas received a total income of €22,728,672 in 2022, an amount that exceeds the forecast by 19% and is evidence of the organisation’s extensive and ongoing fundraising efforts. Of this income, **33.5% came from public sources and 66.5% from private sources.**

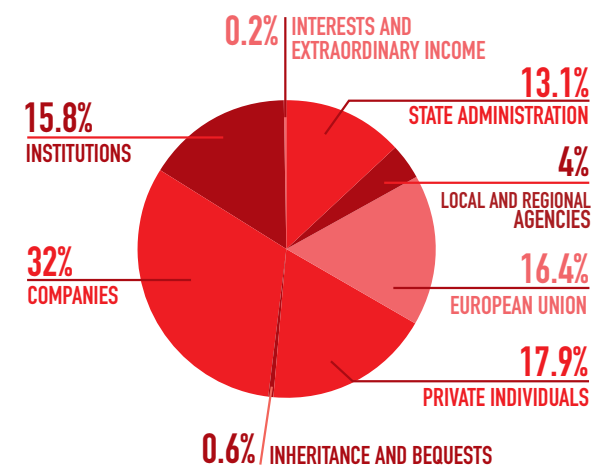
Of particular note was the significant increase in our private funding and, specifically, the growth associated with the **more than 240 organisations, companies and institutions** we work with, whose donations rose by 61%.

Likewise, it is worth noting the **broad support we received for our humanitarian response in Ukraine.** A total of 1,630 people made their first donation to Entreculturas and 367 people decided to become members and add their support to a growing community of **31,892 supporters.**

There was also a significant increase in public income compared to the previous year, specifically from the **State Administration**, up 28%, as well as from the **European Union**, which increased by 83% following the approval of subsidies for international cooperation programmes.

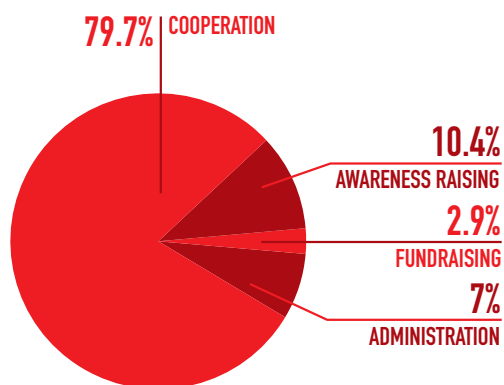


# USE OF FUNDS

The total funds allocated to our mission in 2022 amounted to €20,370,881, or 90% of the total. With this budget, we promoted 204 projects in 45 countries (19 in Latin America, 15 in Africa, five in Asia and one in Europe), which allowed us to serve a total of 361,442 people. On the other hand, the funds allocated to management expenses, €2,250,412, represented 9.9% of the total.

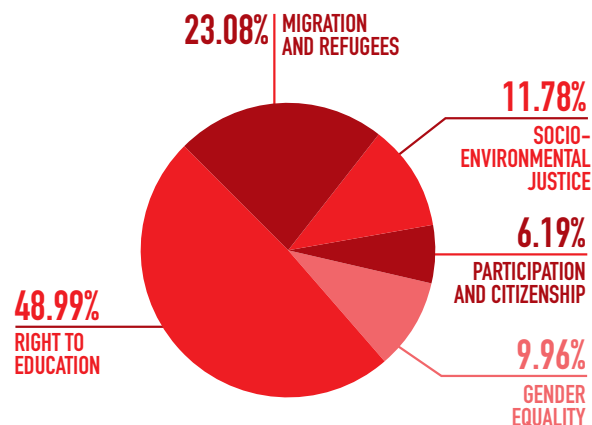

# AUDIT AND TRANSPARENCY

At Entreculturas, we submit our management to external controls to ensure smooth progress and maximum transparency in our work.

The 2022 annual accounts were audited by **Forward Economics, S.L.P.** The resulting audit report gave us a positive rating in all the aspects covered, which means that our accounting faithfully reflects Entreculturas' net worth and financial situation.

In addition, at Entreculturas, we audit the projects we implement internally and/or externally as part of our commitment to quality and transparency. More specifically, **we have audited 70% of the funds managed for projects over the past five years.** Accounting reports and audit reports are publicly available at the Entreculturas headquarters

**We completed a total of 19 audits in 2022**, 17 of them cooperation audits and two citizenship ones. In terms of location, seven of the audits were conducted in Africa, another seven in Latin America and the Caribbean, two in Spain, another two regionally and one in the Middle East.

Classified according to our causes, 11 of the audits fall under education, eight under human mobility, another eight under gender, six under socio-environmental justice and the remaining three under citizen participation. Notable among these audits are the audit of the IV "On the Borders of Colombia" programme, together with JRS-LAC, and the four audits conducted in humanitarian action.



We have the 'Accredited NGDO' seal granted by the **Fundación Lealtad**, a non-profit foundation that evaluates non-governmental organisations based on their transparency in the use of resources and good management practices. Entreculturas has also earned the "Assessed NGDO" seal after successfully complying with the requirements established in the "Transparency and Good Governance Tool" from the **NGDO Coordinator** in Spain.

# WE EVALUATE TO LEARN



Evaluation is a tool which not only ensures transparency and accountability in our work, but also helps us to improve and learn from our interventions.

It allows us to analyse what is happening in relation to our work, to be aware of the impact we have on the people we support and the goals we still have to achieve.

We have evaluated 63.2% of the cooperation funds and 51.7% of the citizenship funds in the last five years. **In 2022 we managed 21 evaluations of international cooperation, humanitarian aid, citizenship and volunteering projects**, and completed 19 of them. These evaluations have been used to create plans for improving our work. One of the highlights of the year was the **evaluation of our "Educating People, Generating Opportunities"**, a programme that stands out for both its volume and scope: 23 projects in 11 countries in Latin America, Africa and Asia, with three lines of action (the right to education, training for employment and humanitarian assistance to migrants).

Another **notable evaluation involves the "Work4Progress"** project, in partnership with Fundación La Caixa, which is an initiative designed primarily to increase the employability and income of young people and indigenous women in vulnerable situations in the provinces of Quispicanchi (Cusco) and Condorcanqui (Amazonas), Peru. The results demonstrated that the net per capita income of 93% of the participating households had doubled and that the employment rate of the targeted individuals increased by 47%.

Working together with the **Fe y Alegría International Federation**, in 2022 we continued to analyse impact evaluations that were conducted during the pandemic at Fe y Alegría schools, specifically in Ecuador and Chad. # 5 JUST CAUSES



Guaranteeing the right to quality education is at the heart of our mission, alongside the other just causes that we focus on: gender equality, solidarity with migrant and refugee populations, socio-environmental justice and citizen participation. All these issues shape our strategy for building a better world every day.



# GUARANTEEING THE RIGHT TO EDUCATION

**We work to ensure that everyone, without exception, is guaranteed their right to a quality education. We place special focus on the groups that face the greatest barriers to accessing this right: girls and women, learners with disabilities, families with limited resources and people experiencing migration or refugee situations.**

A total of **244 million children and young people ages 6-18 were still not in school** in 2022. The COVID-19 crisis resulted in national education budgets falling by more than 30% (with millions of euros invested in health care, social welfare, business relief and job preservation), a situation that called for a redoubling of efforts to avoid a generational catastrophe in education and to ensure that the 2030 Agenda is not written off as lost.



## MORE TEACHERS AND BETTER PAY

The **Global Campaign for Education** (a coalition formed by Entreculturas, Ayuda en Acción, Educo and Plan International) took action to demand an increase in public funding for education, with particular emphasis on the need to remedy the teacher shortage, to invest in teacher qualifications and to guarantee that teachers are adequately paid.

Under the theme **#BillionsOfVoices**, more than 100 countries around the world staged a series of activities to raise awareness of the vital role that teachers play as protectors of the right to education, particularly in the aftermath of the pandemic.



We also published a report called **“The Challenges of International Financing for Education”**, which called on Spanish cooperation organisations to remind them of their commitment to the 2030 Agenda and their pledge to allocate 20% of the country’s Official Development Assistance (ODA) to education (a percentage that currently stands at just 6%).



## THE PLACE WHERE EVERYTHING IS POSSIBLE

Factors like disability, gender inequality, poverty, conflict and the effects of climate change have an impact on access to education around the world. As part of our **Red Chair** campaign, in 2022 we focused our message on the importance of **inclusive education**, one that is committed to

embracing diversity and making school “The place where everything is possible”, this year’s slogan.

To explore in greater depth the situation of educational inclusion of people with disabilities around the world, the campaign was backed by the **“Educating is Including, a Path that Guarantees Rights” report** and a **webinar** with the same name featuring Vernor Muñoz, former UN Special Rapporteur on the right to education; Carmiña de la Cruz, member of the Disability Initiative of the International Federation of Fe y Alegría; Daniela Bruni, expert in emergency education for the Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS); Gregorio Saravia, Delegate for Human Rights and for the Convention of the Spanish Committee of Representatives of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD); Ruben de la Cruz, member of the International Federation for the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (IFPD); Rubén Sequeros, specialist at Fundación AVIVA Foundation; Álvaro Valpuesta, international volunteer from our VOLPA programme in Tanzania; and Beatriz Romero, sign language interpreter who works with the singer-songwriter Rozalén.

We also enjoyed the subsequent visit to Spain by Vernor Muñoz and Carmiña de la Cruz, who joined us on a **press tour at public meetings and events** to promote the report and share a series of recommendations with political representatives from the Spanish Agency for International Cooperation (AECID) and the Secretary of State for International Cooperation (SECI).





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## WE TRAVEL TO ECUADOR WITH THE SINGER-SONGWRITER ROZALÉN

After learning about our work in Guatemala (2019) and Chad (2020), in 2022 we once again took a trip with the singer-songwriter and social activist **Rozalén** and her partner **Beatriz Romero**, a sign language interpreter, this time to Ecuador, where we had the opportunity to introduce them to the **inclusive education** projects that we run together with Fe y Alegría. The experience kicked off in Quito with a visit to the **Emmaus Educational Unit** and the community meeting organised by the mobile school “**Cuéntamelo todo Quito**” (Tell Me Everything Quito), a socio-educational project that has been offering education and

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support to children and adolescents experiencing homelessness for the past 10 years. Next, in Santo Domingo, they had the opportunity to meet the students at the **Fe y Alegría Special Education Unit**, where students are given technical training and assistance with their transition to working life.

There was time at the end of the trip to get a first-hand look at the situation experienced by the refugees and migrants assisted by the **Jesuit Refugee Service** at La Argelia shelter in the southern part of Quito. This space has served as a home for migrant and refugee families since 2000, who come to Ecuador mainly from Colombia and, more recently, from Venezuela.

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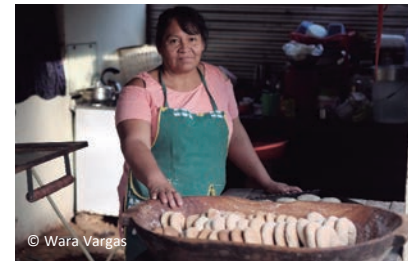
## BUILDING PARTNERSHIPS FOR EDUCATION

We signed a new agreement in 2022 with INDI-TEX to implement projects run jointly with the Social Sector of the Society of Jesus in Spain and with Fe y Alegría, JRS and other Jesuit social centres in 11 countries throughout Latin America,

Africa and Asia. The projects covered by the agreement, which will run from 2023 to 2025, focus on closing educational and digital gaps, creating dignified and sustainable livelihoods

and protecting victims of forced migration as part of the “**Generating Opportunities: Education and Inclusion for a Sustainable World**” programme.

On the other hand, we expanded our collaboration with Accenture through the “**Towards a Digital and Sustainable World**” programme, which is designed to increase the employability of both young people at risk of exclusion and adults who are on the margins of the job market, working directly with our main partner organisations: Fe y Alegría in 17 countries in Latin America, Pedro Arrupe in Mexico and EDUCSI, Radio ECCA and the Jesuit Social Sector in Spain. The strategy is to develop basic digital literacy, technical skills and environmental awareness competencies to qualify them for high-demand jobs.



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In 2022, we launched the “**Generating Opportunities for Committed Youth**” programme, our first collaboration with **Food for The Poor**; we will work with Fe y Alegría in Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala over the next three years to help young people in situations of exclusion to develop on both a personal level and as agents of change for social transformation. Our efforts will focus on helping them to re-enter school, increasing their

opportunities for earning a decent living, and strengthening their youth leadership skills for peace and equality.

In terms of public institutions, the **Spanish Agency for International Development Cooperation (AECID)** renewed its commitment to vocational education in Bolivia, signing a new cooperation agreement to promote training for employment and entrepreneurship for young people, especially women, in rural communities and vulnerable urban areas in seven of the country’s departments.

In Haiti, the AECID financed the construction of the San Ignacio de Loyola Teacher Training and Education College, which will significantly improve the quality of the Haitian education system.

And, thanks to the **European Directorate-General for Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid Operations (DG ECHO)**, we were able to guarantee for another year the right to education for children and adolescents in the context of the humanitarian crisis in Venezuela.

At the local level, the support of **regional, provincial and local governments** was instrumental in sustaining our efforts to reduce the number of children not attending school and

improve the quality of education in countries including Colombia, Ecuador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Peru, El Salvador, Lebanon, Morocco, Chad and Uganda.

Through the **Regional Office Challenge**, the initiative through which our offices in Spain organise their awareness-raising and fundraising activities, the teams in Alicante, Burgos, Cantabria, Cordoba, La Rioja, Madrid, Salamanca, Valencia and Valladolid managed to raise nearly **€46,000 to support education in Haiti**.



## ADVOCATING FOR REFUGEES AND MIGRANTS

**We dream of a society that is open and hospitable, sensitive to the experiences of migrants and refugees and supportive of our demand for a policy and culture that welcomes and shows solidarity towards these groups. We also focus our efforts on detecting and eradicating the root causes of these processes of forced mobility throughout the world.**



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### WAR BREAKS OUT IN UKRAINE

Not many of us could have imagined on the morning of 24 February 2022 that a bloody war would be knocking on Europe's door. Millions of people in **Ukraine** have since been forced to flee their homes in search of refuge in other parts of the country or in neighbouring ones.

Entreculturas and Alboan, together with the Xavier Network and JRS, activated our protocol to provide emergency **assistance, reception and support** to the refugee population both in Ukraine and its bordering countries, as well as in Spain, in coordination with the Jesuit Migrant Service (SJM).

Following an initial emergency phase that raised over €5 million, all the organisations involved designed a joint action plan to aid 73,000 refugees who have fled Ukraine, called **“One Proposal”**, offering refuge, accommodation and basic necessities, legal and health assistance, psychosocial support and education over the next three years. In addition to work in Ukraine itself, the program includes joint work with Romania, Hungary, Poland, Moldova and Slovakia.

Specifically, the aim was to help support Fe y Alegría schools and ensure their continued survival during the major difficulties the country is experiencing, by covering the payment of teachers' salaries and the cost of measures to guarantee security in schools.

Also significant in 2022 was **Fe y Alegría's progressive internationalisation**, which continued to plant seeds in new locations in both Africa and Asia in 2022: Guinea Conakry, Cambodia, Nepal, Kenya and Angola.



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### OTHER CRISES BEYOND EUROPE

The war in Ukraine was the focus of much of the media attention in 2022, but Entreculturas continued to shine the spotlight on other forgotten crises such as the ones in **Lebanon, Morocco, Ethiopia, DR Congo, South Sudan, Venezuela and Mexico**.

Of the more than **100 million forcibly displaced people** in 2022, 30 million are in Africa. Climate adversities and especially political conflicts in **Eritrea, Somalia** and the Tigray region of northern **Ethiopia** continued to displace millions of people, most of them to Sudan and Uganda, the two African countries with the highest reception rates.

Violence in **South Sudan, Central African Republic** and **DR Congo** also triggered a massive influx of refugees to both countries. We partner with **JRS** in these regions to provide humanitarian aid, medical assistance, psychosocial support, access to education and skills training. And not only to the refugee population, but also to internally displaced people and host communities who are already facing extremely precarious circumstances.

In Central America, institutional fragility and escalating violence –mainly by gangs and drug trafficking cartels– have led to a significant increase in the number of refugees, displaced people and asylum seekers in recent years: close to 1 million from **El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala**. Alongside the Jesuit Network for Migrants (Servicio Jesuita a Migrantes), our work in this region continues to focus on defending human rights for the most vulnerable migrants,

displaced people and refugees and their families; on reporting the structural causes that force these people to flee their homes; and on trying to strengthen the culture of welcome and peaceful coexistence.

Thanks to the ongoing **“Education in Emergency in Venezuela”** agreement, funded by **DG ECHO**, and the **“On the Borders of South America”** programme, supported by **Inditex**, in 2022 we were able to continue serving thousands of people affected by the country’s structural, economic and political crisis (more than 7 million people have fled Venezuela in search of safety and a better life). Through the first programme, we **guaranteed educational continuity for more than 12,000 students** at 20 Fe y Alegría schools; with the second, we facilitated access to basic rights and to education focused on reconciliation and the prevention of violence for around **7,300 people in Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador and Venezuela**.

After 12 years of conflict, in 2022 **Syria** hit the figure of 5.5 million people that have been driven out of the country. After Turkey, **Lebanon** is its second most important host country. There, in partnership with **JRS**, we continued to support **3,600 Syrian refugee children and adults** in the Bekaa Valley to ensure their well-being, build their resilience and promote both their social and educational integration.

## OUR WORK IN SPAIN

Through our **“Refuge School”** campaign, we raised the alarm about the fact that **100 million people worldwide have been forced to flee their homes**, with a special focus on how war and displacement affect children and how education is the only tool that can rebuild children’s lives. A message that was powerfully echoed by the **vio-**

**linist Ara Malikian** with the benefit concert he performed at the **Teatro Real** for the refugee children’s projects that we support in Lebanon and in Madrid through the **Fundación Amoverse** and **Pueblos Unidos**, in collaboration with Banco Santander.

From our regional offices, we joined the **#WalkingforPeace** initiative organised by the Hospitality campaign together with the Jesuit social works in Spain and, hand in hand with **Pueblos Unidos**, we launched the **“Soy Acogida” (I Am Welcomed)** campaign to promote a culture of hospitality, inclusion and social justice.



Finally, our **22<sup>nd</sup> Annual Meeting**, once again in person following the pandemic, also focused on human mobility. Under the theme **“Lives in Movement”**, more than 230 people from both the headquarters and our 27 regional offices came together to participate in workshops and discussions on how to defend migrants’ and refugees’ right to a dignified life.

# PROMOTING SOCIO-ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE

Our current economic model of unlimited growth clashes with finite planetary resources and severely impacts already excluded groups. Although macroeconomic indicators in many countries are improving, extreme poverty persists and inequality is increasing, with millions of people being left behind. We all have a responsibility to build more sustainable, equitable and peaceful models.



## IN DEFENCE OF OUR COLLECTIVE HOME

“Somos Amazonía” (We Are the Amazon) is how Entreculturas and Alboan jointly responded to the cries of a wounded Earth. Joining forces to launch the campaign in 2022, we aimed to mobilise the population to combat climate change and to defend the Amazon and the people who live there.



We also raised awareness of the connections between the current economic model and the global socio-environmental crisis through the **press conference we held to present the “We Are the Amazon: Ecofeminist Keys to the Defence of the Amazon” report**, calling for the EU’s

Corporate Sustainability Due Diligence Directive (CSDDD) to be truly effective in protecting human rights and the environment.

“Somos Amazonía” also featured a travelling exhibition called “Defensoras de la Naturaleza” (The Defenders of Nature), which was displayed in dozens of schools, town halls and cultural centres.

The tour led by the Jesuit **Fernando López** and the indigenous nuns **Arizete** and **Raimunda** was also instrumental: the mobilisation of our teams in Seville, Granada, Badajoz, La Palma, Tenerife, Gran Canaria, Lanzarote, Madrid, Vitoria, León, Coruña, Vigo and Santiago resulted in **over 40 activities including chats, meetings, celebrations, interviews, etc.**



## RUN FOR A CAUSE: RUN FOR THE AMAZON

The 11th edition of our “Run for a Cause” solidarity race brought together more than **17,000 people in 24 Spanish cities and eight countries** to raise money to defend the Amazon and its indigenous communities.

Additionally, **36 schools** put on a version of the race and worked on the educational units related to the theme.

We were able to hold this event thanks, once again, to the support of **Caixabank, Deloitte, Liferay** and **Mapfre** (and the help of more than 60 other companies that contributed by purchasing race bibs, donating products and corporate volunteering) and were joined by actresses **Cristina Gallego** (who kicked off the race in Madrid) and **Kira Miró** and the karate expert **Damián Quintero**.



## WANTED: SOCIALLY RESPONSIBLE COMPANIES

Well aware of the role human activity and, particularly, large corporations play in the depletion of natural resources, as members of the **Platform for Responsible Business (PER** for its acronym in Spanish) we launched the “**A Law Made in Spain**” campaign to collection signatures for a Spanish due



diligence law that would require Spanish companies to incorporate measures that respect human and environmental rights (following in the footsteps of several European countries like France, Holland, Germany and Norway).



We joined the **Impact Foundations Fund** in 2022, which aims to encourage foundations and non-profit organisations to work together and allocate part of their capital or budgets to projects that have a significant social impact, so that the participating organisations not only maximise their support, but also achieve greater sustainability and even profitability. Two Spanish social ventures were funded through this call for proposals **Apadrinaunolivo.org** and **RobinGood**. The

first aims to counter rural depopulation by recovering and promoting the value of thousands of abandoned olive trees in Oliete (Teruel) and the second offers local, sustainable artisan products produced in bakeries in Catalonia, the Basque Country and Aragon by people with difficulties in accessing employment opportunities.

To involve schools and companies in solidarity recycling, we launched **RECICOLES**, a programme designed both to protect the environment and to contribute to a social cause by doing something as simple as recycling writing materials. A total of **16 companies** and **34 schools** have joined this initiative.

This project is based on the partnership forged with TerraCycle, the recycling company that donates to Entreculturas based on the amount of material it receives. The funds raised are allocated to different initiatives that we run in the Amazon.



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## SUSTAINABILITY PROGRAMMES AND PROJECTS

For more than 15 years, Entreculturas and **Accenture** have worked together on programs aimed at technological improvement of Fe y Alegría educational centers, as well as on training programs with an important focus on digital skills to improve job placement opportunities

for students from Latin America and Spain. In 2022, with the beginning of the **“Towards a Digital and Sustainable World”** programme, we have taken another step by incorporating the sustainability approach by promoting green jobs or actions to protect the environment specifically.

In addition, we have jointly designed a course that is incorporated into the training catalog offered to young people from the **19 countries** that are participating in the program, which places special emphasis on the development of eco-labor competence. Through these actions we will reach **137,434 people** throughout the two-year duration of the programme.



Thanks to the ongoing **“Strengthening the Rural Family Economy in Paraguay”** project, financed by the Spanish Agency for International Development Cooperation (AECID), we continue to support **286 rural farmers and 308 students from agtech schools** with their production and sales capacities. With the economic and climatic crisis (drought) that the country is experiencing, combined with the expansion of automated agriculture and the extensive cultivation of soya and

maize, these families are finding it increasingly difficult to sustain their livelihoods, putting their food security in jeopardy. Through this programme, we will provide farmers and agricultural schools with the right technology, supplies and equipment they need to diversify their crops, build their business management skills, and promote the inclusion of young people and women in the life of the organisations and in decision-making positions.



Phase 2 of the **“Social innovation programme to improve the income and jobs of young people and women (Work 4 Progress)”**, financed by **Fundación La Caixa** and implemented in the regions of Cusco and Amazonas (Peru) by Entreculturas, CCAIJO, SAIPE, Fe y Alegría Perú and Fundación AVSI, came to an end in late 2022.

The programme has supported a total of **690 businesses ventures** in different fields (dairy products, guinea pig production, rural tourism, hen

sales, banana flour, among others), as well as the integration of young people into the workforce, generating a total of 1,179 jobs.



# PROMOTING GENDER EQUALITY

We are committed to gender equality as a prerequisite for justice and to the promotion of specific programmes for the empowerment of women and girls to compensate for the historical disadvantages they experience. We promote structural changes in culture and the defence of gender equality as a fundamental human right and a key strategy for peace and development.

## STANDING WITH MIGRANT, DISPLACED AND REFUGEE WOMEN AND GIRLS

Our work in gender equality in 2022 focused specifically on migrant, displaced and refugee women and girls. After the outbreak of war in Ukraine, Entreculturas, Alboan, the Servicio Jesuita a Migrantes (Jesuit Migrant Service) Spain

and Fundación Ellacuría launched a **signature drive** to call on the European Commission to include measures in the European Pact on Migration and Asylum that consider the gender aspect and guarantee the **specific protection of women in migratory processes**.

In March, as part of International Women's Day, we promoted the **"Mujeres en Marcha" (Women on the Move)** campaign together with Alboan, to raise awareness and condemn the plight of women in migration processes, and we travelled to the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) with a group of media professionals and journalists to create spaces for meeting and discussion with Congolese women journalists and thus gain first-hand knowledge of the country's situation and of the women forced to leave their homes. They told us about the growing trend towards a feminisation of migration, the double discrimination they suffer for being migrants and for being women, and the consequences they must face (human trafficking, labour and sexual exploitation, various forms of violence, etc.) in their home country, during their journey and when they arrived at their destination. The DRC has approximately 4.5 million internally displaced people and more than 800,000 refugees in neighbouring countries. Against this backdrop, **women and girls are used as weapons of war**, making it one of the most violent countries for them to live in.

**Caddy Adzuba**, Congolese journalist, lawyer and women's rights activist, who visited us in November to mark the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women,



also spoke to us about this issue. At a meeting with media professionals at our headquarters, Caddy shared the reality of the DR Congo with her colleagues, urging them to act responsibly when reporting to avoid feeding into stereotypes that spread a distorted image of Africa, and reminding them that communication is a powerful tool that can contribute to the empowerment of women.



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## 10 YEARS OF LIGHT AGAINST THE DARKNESS OF VIOLENCE

Despite all the difficulties and specific forms of violence they've experienced, the women and girls we work with are far from victims; rather, they're a testimony to strength and hope and are committed to fighting for action and social change.

This is a trait they share with the members of our **"The LIGHT of the GIRLS"** programme, which we have been running since 2012. Over these **10 years of engagement**, we have focused on providing prevention, assistance and advocacy for girls who are victims of violence, working to guarantee their right to a life of equal opportunities, free from fear, threats and aggression.

We have served and supported over **58,000 girls** to date through projects in **16 countries in Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean**. Specifically, in 2022, 1,300 girls participated in the program through our strategic partners Fe y Alegría and/or JRS in the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Guatemala, Honduras, Ecuador, Peru, Chad, Ethiopia, Kenya, DR Congo, South



Sudan and Uganda. Twenty of them also participated in a virtual workshop where they were able to share their experiences, ideas, opinions and dreams, jointly drafting the **#SafeandSound Global Manifesto** with 11 petitions which they presented to different public institutions in their respective countries in October to mark the International Day of the Girl Child, as well as read during numerous advocacy events.



## THE CURSE OF BEING A GIRL

French journalist **Dominique Sigaud** also helped us shed light on the structural violence that girls suffer around the world.

In an event at the Círculo de Bellas Artes featuring Dominique Sigaud, moderated by lawyer María de la Valgoma and attended by our communications director Raquel Martín; the director of Mundo Cooperante, Alban del Pino; the director of Save the Children, Andrés Conde, and Victoria Gómez-Trenor; she presented her book **“La Malédiction d’être fille (The Curse of Being a Girl)”** in Spain, translated into Spanish (“La maldición de ser niña”) through the partnership between Grupo Comunicación Loyola, Editorial Mensajero and Victoria Gómez-Trénor.

## THE #VOYASER AND “TEACHERS IN AFRICA” PROGRAMMES

Forty percent of students in Latin America never complete secondary education, a gap that is even wider for girls, who usually drop out of school to take care of household chores. In response to this fact, we partnered with Fe y Alegría and

**Santillana** in 2022 to launch our **#VoyaSer (#IAMGoingToBe)** initiative designed to provide comprehensive support to adolescents at risk of exclusion in Latin America, with the goal of guiding them through the last year of secondary education to help them complete their compulsory schooling and learn digital and socio-emotional skills. A total of **150 girls (and 52 teachers)** from Fe y Alegría schools in Guatemala and Peru in areas with high levels of poverty and inequality are participating in the first year of the project.

And we worked together with Fe y Alegría and JRS to launch the **“Teachers in Africa”** scholarship programme in 2022, seeking to place **189 women** in teaching roles in **Chad, DR Congo and Uganda** to promote good role models for girls in schools, as well as to respond to the need to increase the number of female teachers in secondary schools.



## ENTRE CULTURAS EQUALITY PLAN AND SAFE ENVIRONMENT SYSTEM

After more than two years of diagnosis, dialogue and planning, in 2022 the Ministry of Labour approved our **Equality Plan**, a document that sets out our four-year action plan to ensure equal treatment and opportunities for women and men at work, as well as to eliminate discriminatory situations based on gender.

The Entreculturas Equality Plan is an expression of and commitment to gender equality in terms of who we are and what we do, an exercise in line with our values and just causes that is applied internally and in our strategies and lines of action resulting from the Common Strategic Framework.

This plan also addresses the awareness that **equality between men and women is a human rights issue**, a condition for social justice and a fundamental prerequisite for achieving equality, development and peace.

On the other hand, as part of the Safe Environment System –which the Society of Jesus rolled out in 2021 and which Entreculturas has adopted ever since in the aim to create and promote safe spaces, activities and relationships– we published the **“Guide to Safe Environments in Non-Formal Education”**.

This guide is the result of a collaborative process with educators supported by Porticus, with the participation of the Holistic team at the Universidad de Comillas, Entreculturas, Amoverse and INJUCAM, with input from UNICEF and Save the Children.



# STRENGTHENING PARTICIPATION AND GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP

We firmly believe in volunteering as tool for engagement and personal transformation that leads to a critical and committed citizenship. A tool which, together with our mobilisation, awareness-raising, advocacy and communication programmes and our daily work with the educational community and the institutions we collaborate with, represent the cornerstones on which we base our project for social transformation.

## YOUNG PEOPLE AS AGENTS OF SOCIAL CHANGE

Under the title “Agents of Change 4.7”, the 8<sup>th</sup> Global Meeting of the Entreculturas Youth Solidarity Network brought together 220 young people and teachers from nine countries in Latin America, Africa and Europe in Madrid to collectively design an action plan to address the main development challenges under the 2030 Agenda.

Leveraging several collaborative methodologies, the young people participated in workshops where they shared their opinions and identified concrete measures that could be implemented in the coming years in relation to gender equality,

environmental protection, forced migration, the right to education and citizen participation. These ideas were pooled into the “Agents of Change Action Plan”, a roadmap that will guide different groups as they drive forward social transformation in their communities. Educators worked at the same time on learning tools and resources to help the young people in their efforts in the best possible way.

At the end of the Meeting, young people and teachers from the **Generation 21+ Network** (from Ecuador, Nicaragua, Honduras, Dominican Republic, Argentina, Guatemala, Colombia, Chad and Democratic Republic of Congo) toured the different Entreculturas regional offices, participating in educational, mobilisation and advocacy efforts to kick start the Action Plan.



In its 20 years of service, the Solidarity Network has assisted more than **9,600 young people**, together with nearly **300 educators** from nine Autonomous Communities. It has also linked up with other groups of young people and teachers from other Latin American and African countries through the Generation 21+ Network.

This initiative is now established as a channel for youth participation and empowerment, helping youth between the ages of 12 and 18 to develop solidarity-driven values and attitudes and to acquire the basic skills needed to become global citizens. So much so that, in Spain, two of its members were invited to join the new **State Council for Child and Adolescent Participation** promoted by the Ministry of Social Rights and Agenda 2030. Both represent the JRS in this advisory body that aims to lend a voice to this group, to learn about the issues that affect them and to defend their rights in society.



## IN PARTNERSHIP FOR A GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP

The second phase of the collaboration between Alboan, Entreculturas, InteRed and Oxfam Intermón to achieve target 4.7 of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and to integrate Global Citizenship Education into the Spanish

education system came to an end in 2022. Teacher training needs were studied in depth through research analysing the status of the field and the **4.7 Movement** was launched





during this 2018-2022 period, which was marked by the pandemic. Twenty organisations, collectives and teachers' networks joined in this effort. Additionally, AECID renewed its support of the process through the financing of a new agreement for another four years: **"Alliance 4.7 for Global Citizenship: fulfilling our commitment in 2030"**, which we will promote together with Alboan, InteRed and ONGAWA.



## NEW PODCAST WITH JULIA NAVARRO

We launched **"Voces por una Causa" (Voices for a Cause)**, the Entreculturas podcast hosted by writer and journalist **Julia Navarro**, as a vehicle for sharing the issues, projects and campaigns that our work involves. Each programme explores the reality of the countries we work in and

the causes we work on, creating a space for discussion and debate with first-person testimonies and voices. Podcasts are streamed every Thursday and can be enjoyed on a range of platforms including **Spotify, Ivoox, Apple Podcast and YouTube**. Since the launch, Julia has interviewed several guests from diverse fields: people from the world of art and culture, such as the singer-songwriter Rozalén; journalists, like Óscar Mijallo, Ángeles Espinosa, Olga Rodríguez and Khadija Amin; writers like Inés Martín or Nazanín Armanian; filmmakers like Imanol Uribe and many other experts on the causes that underpin our mission.



## BACK TO NORMAL FOR OUR INTERNATIONAL VOLUNTEERING PROGRAMMES

Although the year opened with a new wave of COVID-19 striking the world, the pace of **VOLPA** volunteers' departure remained steady: a total of **13 people travelled** to their destination countries (Bolivia, Brazil, Chad, Chile, Ecuador,

Guatemala, Honduras, Kenya, Morocco, Peru, DR Congo, Dominican Republic and Uganda), hosted by our partner organisations like Fe y Alegría and JRS. We also resumed in-person training once the health alert came to an end.

It was also a joy to resume the **"Experiencia Sur" (Southern Experience)** and **"Profes en Compañía" (Teachers Together)** programmes, which we suspended for two summers because of the pandemic. A total of **10 people in four countries** participated in 2022: Guatemala, Ecuador, Peru and Colombia. They included volunteers from our regional offices and teachers from various Jesuit schools in Spain.



## A VALUE PROPOSITION FOR OUR COMPANIES

We work with more than **200 national and international companies** every year, together developing projects and promoting all aspects of Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR). To structure our entire value proposition for the private sector, in 2022 we launched **"Empresas por una**

**Causa" (Companies for a Cause)**, our programme for small and medium-sized companies that are committed to justice, equality and sustainability and that want to make a difference by supporting one of our projects.



## CELEBRATING THE NEW LAW ON COOPERATION

Spain's approval of the **Law on Cooperation for Sustainable Development and Global Solidarity** in late 2022 could not have been a better way to end the year.

After decades of our advocacy efforts, Congress confirmed its commitment to **allocate 0.7% of the country's Gross National Income to Official Development Assistance (ODA)**. The new law also provides for the obligation to allocate at least 10% of ODA to humanitarian action and, among other things, lays the foundations for a **future Statute of Aid Workers** that will serve to regulate and professionalise this work. Entreculturas, as a member of the Cooperation Council and the Governing Board of the Spanish NGO Coordinating Committee, has participated in recent years in different forums for dialogue in the Spanish Congress of Deputies in pursuit of this end, and we welcome these advances.

# AGREEMENTS AND PROGRAMMES

## COVID-19 EDUCATION EMERGENCY

In January 2023, the regional support programme for the educational emergency derived from the Covid-19 pandemic ended in 21 countries in Latin America and Africa (Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Colombia, Chile, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Nicaragua, Paraguay, Peru, Dominican Republic, Uruguay, Venezuela, Chad, DR Congo, Madagascar, Guinea and Kenya). Within the framework of the Xavier Network and with the help of Fe y Alegría, we have provided help during these three years in basic areas such as **food, health, psy-**

**chological and spiritual assistance, housing and job security as well as awareness and self-care campaigns**, always with the objective that students could access quality education and not have their learning process interrupted.

## JOB TRAINING



The last year of this agreement, financed by AECID and implemented by Fe y Alegría Bolivia and IRFA, was 2022. It was implemented in four of the country's departments (Chuquisaca, Potosí, Santa Cruz and La Paz) and focused on **improving the employability and entrepreneurial skills of 19,695 young people and adults** (59% women) from 11 municipalities, who are studying Productive Technological Technical Education for a more relevant and high-quality socio-labour integration with a focus on gender, the environment, interculturality and inclusion, where no one is left behind.

## PROTECTION FOR THE REFUGEE POPULATION IN LEBANON

The main objective of this Convention, which was launched in 2019 and is scheduled to end in mid-2023, is to ensure access to a comprehensive protection system that ensures the building of resilience and the improvement of the physical, psychological and social well-being of **2,175 Syrian refugee girls and women and 1,425 Syrian refugee boys and men in the Bekaa Valley**. The main achievement of the past year was to bring back a normal school routine for more than 3,000 refugee children and young people, with all the consequences that

this involves, particularly in terms of rehabilitating and protecting this group of children that have been severely affected first by the pandemic and then by the deep political, economic and social crisis in which Lebanon is mired.

## EDUCATION IN EMERGENCIES IN VENEZUELA

The purpose of this agreement funded by DG ECHO and launched in 2021 is to guarantee the right to education of children and adolescents against the backdrop of the humanitarian crisis in Venezuela through a comprehensive strategy that combines **setting up safe spaces** (protection: food, hygiene, physical and psycho-emotional health) with ensuring that children have the necessary resources to **continue their education** (infrastructure, teaching resources, teachers' salaries, COVID prevention). The development of these two components

in 20 Fe y Alegría schools in 2022 benefited a total of **12,125 primary and secondary school students** in five states: Anzoátegui, Miranda, Sucre, Táchira and Apure.



## INSTITUTIONAL STRENGTHENING OF FE Y ALEGRÍA

Responding to the lines of action outlined in the programme (sustainability, innovation, networking, new Fe y Alegría and exceptional situations), 2022 was the second year of implementation of the three-year initiative.

**Twenty-three proposals** were received from Fe y Alegría countries and residences, and a total of €648,000 were awarded.

## AID AND PROTECTION FOR MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES IN MOROCCO

The second year of the "Assistance and protection of vulnerable migrants on the north coast of Morocco" initiative, financed by the North Africa window of the EU-Africa Trust Fund, was implemented in 2022. **We have been able to help 3,840 people** (1,987 men, 1,241 women, 110 unaccompanied children, 20 unaccompanied girls, 238 accompanied boys and 244 accompanied girls) through

this programme. The programme's main areas of action include direct assistance and support for Moroccan health facilities, psychosocial support, training and awareness-raising on rights, emergency accommodation and the completion of administrative paperwork.

The "Assistance and protection of the migrant and refugee population in the north of Morocco (Tangier and Nador)" project, funded by AEXCID and launched in October 2021, and the "Assistance and protection of the migrant and refugee population in the north of Morocco (Tangier and Nador)" project, funded by the Regional Government of Galicia, were also completed in 2022.



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## TO EDUCATE IS TO INCLUDE

The second year of the programme was in 2022, coinciding with the return to in-person classes in the three participating countries; the programme also gained momentum in **Bolivia, Ecuador and Peru** with teacher training programmes, upgrading equipment and partnerships to contribute to the right to quality education for **389 children and adolescents with disabilities**.

We also strongly focused on the awareness-raising and advocacy component in 2022 with the visit of the singer-songwriter Rozalén in Ecuador in March and the publication of the report “Educating is Including” within the framework of the La Silla Roja awareness and advocacy campaign.

## THE LIGHT OF THE GIRLS

Entreculturas has been working on the LIGHT of the GIRLS programme since 2012, responding to the challenges that this group experiences in African and Latin American and Caribbean countries in terms of unequal and abusive relationships. The programme includes three lines of work: **prevention, care for girls who are victims of violence and guaranteeing educational access**, understanding school as a space that provides protection.

A total of 1,300 girls participated in 2022 in the areas of educational access and prevention, and 100 girls received psychological care to rebuild their emotional health after experiencing physical or sexual violence or both. The programme was implemented in 2022 in the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Guatemala, Honduras, Ecuador, Peru, Chad, Ethiopia, Kenya, DR Congo, South Sudan and Uganda, in partnership with our strategic partners Fe y Alegría and JRS. Likewise, as part of the communication and awareness-raising activities we used to promote the programme, we held a virtual workshop in which twenty girls were able to share their realities and dreams and collaboratively draft the **#SafeandSound Global Manifesto**.

## TEACHERS IN AFRICA

Through this programme, which we launched together with Fe y Alegría and JRS in 2022 with a three-year timeline, we hope to help integrate **189 women into the teaching profession** in Chad, DR Congo and Uganda, enhancing young women’s engagement in the development of their communities and the recognition of their fundamental rights. In addition to promoting access to official training programmes, the programme helps the professional development of

these young women by providing them with psychosocial as well as educational support and reinforcement, and by providing them with professional internships in their communities throughout their training.



## EDUCATE PEOPLE, GENERATE OPPORTUNITIES

This three-year Inditex-backed programme was completed at the end of 2022, **reducing inequalities and empowering more than 200,000 people** living in poverty, exclusion and displacement in 12 countries in Latin America, Africa and Asia as well as in Spain. The 25 projects implemented, related to education, employment and humanitarian aid, responded to the needs of vulnerable groups such as children, women, young people and displaced people, in situations marked by progressive recovery following the pandemic.

## ON THE BORDERS OF SOUTH AMERICA

Together with Inditex, we are implementing this three-year programme that focuses on addressing the needs of the displaced Venezuelan population affected by the country's socio-economic crisis, although it also includes working with people from host communities who are affected by the same problems.

Our work facilitates access to basic rights (including legal and psychosocial support) and offers education with a special focus on reconciliation and the prevention of violence. In total, we expect to **serve 20,000 people** (63% women and 37% men) in Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador and Venezuela.



## TOWARDS A DIGITAL AND SUSTAINABLE WORLD

Backed by Accenture, this programme kicked off in March 2022 and promotes better employability and job placement for vulnerable groups in 19 countries in Latin America and Spain, with a special focus on green jobs. The programme also includes a framework of educational and awareness-raising initiatives on environmental protection both in Spain and in five countries in the Pan-Amazon region. These efforts **will reach 137,434 people** over the two-year duration of the programme.

## CREATING OPPORTUNITIES FOR ENGAGED YOUTH

The first programme resulting from our partnership with **Food for The Poor** was launched in July 2022, thanks to which we will work with Fe y Alegría in Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala over the next three years to enable young people in situations of exclusion to develop both personally and as agents of change for social transformation. To this end, we help them return to school, improve their access to livelihoods and build their skills for youth leadership for peace and equality.

## DIGITAL EDUCATION PROGRAMME (Profuturo)

This programme, supported by Profuturo, seeks to promote digital skills development so that teachers and students can meet the challenges of today's society.

We continued the project, which began in 2019, in the Dzaleka refugee camp (Malawi) in 2022, helping a total of **3,600 students and 67 teachers** through digital education and psychosocial support.



## WORK 4 PROGRESS

Phase 2 of the **“Social innovation programme to improve the income and jobs of young people and women (Work 4 Progress)”**, financed by Fundación La Caixa and implemented in the regions of Cusco and Amazonas (Peru) by Entreculturas, CCAIJO, SAIPE, Fe y Alegría Perú and Fundación AVSI, came to an end in late 2022.

The programme has supported a total of 690 individual ventures in different fields (dairy products, guinea pig production, rural tourism, hen sales, banana flour, among others, as well as decent jobs for young people, generating a total of 1,179 equivalent jobs.



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## PARTNERSHIPS FOR A GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP

We have successfully completed the implementation of the **“For a transformative education and global citizenship committed to the fulfilment of the SDGs”** agreement between Alboan, Interred, Entreculturas and Oxfam Intermón. Some of the key results include the creation of the 4.7 Movement, and the publication and transfer of the **“Transformative Education for Global Citizenship (TEGC) in the Spanish education system”** report.

A new phase will start in January 2023, with the NGDO ONGAWA joining the consortium (and Oxfam leaving), with the support of the AECID again until the end of 2026, and with Entreculturas as the consortium leader. The new **“Partnership 4.7 for Global Citizenship: fulfilling our commitment in 2030”** agreement is designed to strengthen the capacities of the major stakeholders in education for sustainable development and global citizenship to advance the development of target 4.7 in Spain's formal education system.
