With the worst of COVID-19 behind us, the situation in 2022 called for a redoubling of efforts to avoid a generational catastrophe in education and to ensure that the 2030 Agenda is not written off as lost. With initiatives such as #BillionsOfVoices,

promoted by the Global Campaign for Education, and "The place where everything is possible", the slogan of our **The Red** Chair campaign, we advocated for increased international funding to strengthen education systems, particularly in the countries hardest hit by the pandemic.

On the other hand, we continued with our "Education in Emergencies" agreement in Venezuela, the "To Educate Is to Include" programme in Peru, Bolivia and Ecuador and we renewed our agreements with Inditex and Accenture to continue closing the education gap and promoting employability across Latin America, Africa, Asia and Spain.





The outbreak of war in Ukraine forced millions of people to flee their homes

in search of refuge in other parts of the country or in neighbouring ones. In collaboration with the Xavier Network, the Jesuit Refugee Service and the Jesuit Migrant Service, at Entreculturas and Alboan we activated our emergency protocol to provide care, shelter and support to this group of displaced people. At the same time, we continued to focus on other forgotten world crises where we have been active for years, including Lebanon, Morocco, Ethiopia, the Democratic Republic of Congo, South Sudan, Venezuela and Mexico.

From our regional offices, we joined the **#WalkingforPeace** initiative organised by the Hospitality campaign together with the Jesuit social works in Spain and, hand in hand with the NGO Pueblos Unidos, we launched the **Soy Acogida (I Am Welcomed)** campaign to promote a culture of hospitality, inclusion and social justice. This was a message that **violinist Ara Malikian** helped us to convey at Christmas through a moving solidarity concert to benefit refugee children.





By launching **Somos Amazonía** (We Are the Amazon), we aimed to mobilise the population to

combat climate change and to defend the Amazon and the people who live there. The **Defensoras de la Naturaleza (The Defenders of Nature)** exhibition was displayed in schools, town halls and cultural centres, resulting in several educational and awareness-raising activities.

The 11th edition of our Run for a Cause solidarity race brought together more than 17,000 people in 24 Spanish cities and eight countries to defend indigenous peoples and their lands. And, from the Platform for Responsible Business (PER for its acronym in Spanish), we launched the A Law Made in Spain campaign to call for a Spanish due diligence law that would require companies to incorporate measures that respect human and environmental rights.



WE ARE WORKING TOWARDS GENDER EQUALITY

Our work in gender equality this year focused specifically on migrant, displaced and refugee women. In March, working together with Alboan, we promoted the **Mujeres en Marcha (Women on the Move)** campaign to mark International Women's Day and travelled to **DR Congo** to learn about the realities on the ground and the women who are forced to leave their homes.



To mark 11 October, the Day of the Girl Child, some twenty representatives of our LIGHT of the GIRLS Programme in Guatemala, South Sudan, Spain, El Salvador, Peru, Honduras, Kenya, Nicaragua and Chad participated in the #SafeandSound initiative during

a virtual workshop during which they drafted a **manifesto with 11 petitions** that they sent to different national and international public institutions.





Under the title Agents of Change 4.7, the 8th Global Meeting of the Entreculturas

Youth Solidarity Network brought together 230 young people and teachers from nine countries in Latin America, Africa and Europe in Madrid. We also resumed our Annual Meeting, where teams from our different Entreculturas offices meet to deepen our understanding of the current state of human mobility in the world. Furthermore, Spain's approval of the Law on Cooperation could not have been a better way to end the year. After decades of advocacy, Congress confirmed its commitment to allocate 0.7% of the country's Gross National Income to cooperation projects.
